KSHSAA Board of Directors Election Procedures

The KSHSAA Board of Directors election procedures are printed in the **center section** of this journal. They reflect the governance procedure authored by member schools and approved in April of 1993 by the Kansas Legislature.

Members of the board of directors shall include members of the State Board of Education; at large appointees of the State Board of Education; Board of Education members elected by local boards of education; superintendents, principals and educators elected by member schools representing senior high leagues; independent schools; middle/junior high school principals or superintendents; and allied professional organizations which guarantees gender and minority/ethnic representation.

The *2011-12 KSHSAA Handbook* lists the current "State of Kansas Identifying Statutes" (K.S.A. 1993 Supp. 72-130, -131, -132, -133 and -134) on pages 11 and 12.

Individual Achievement Awards—in School Competitions

Question: May individuals receive trophies or plaques for individual achievement in interscholastic competition?

Answer: Students may receive medals, recognition certificates or ribbons for individual achievement in interscholastic competition, but **they may not personally receive and keep trophies or plaques for their achievements.** If an individual wins a trophy, the trophy becomes the property of the school. The student could receive a medal as a remembrance for that achievement.

It is not permissible to present small event trophies to individuals in lieu of medals.

Question: Are award rules different when students compete in non-school competitions?

Answer: Yes. **Awards Rule 20-1-3** allows students to accept medals, trophies, plaques or T-Shirts, but not other items having cash and merchandise value.

Scrimmage Rule Defined

Schools may **not** hold **interschool** scrimmages (practices in athletics, debate or scholars bowl). (**See Rule 30-1-5**) Interschool is defined as junior high school with another junior high school and senior high school with another senior high school. This does not eliminate **scrimmages** between alumni and the school team. Additionally, member schools are not permitted to scrimmage junior college or college teams, or "Approved School" list teams.

During a **scrimmage** there can be **no score kept and no clock used.** Should score and/or time be involved, it is no longer a scrimmage; instead, it would be a **game** and must count toward the number of contests allowed during the season.

Intrasquad scrimmages, games among teammates, even with score, time and/or officials **are not considered a game.**

As a coach and active member of the Kansas Coaches Association (KCA), Ginny Honomichl worked tirelessly throughout her professional career for the betterment of all high school sports. As a young coach she was a true pioneer in high school girls sports. At Russell High School (1970-1986) she started the girls track and basketball programs, and also coached girls tennis. During a 22 year career at Baldwin High School she coached boys & girls tennis and softball.

Throughout her coaching career Ginny went the extra mile to improve herself, and to promote her achievements in education and athletics. She was instrumental in achieving many improvements in all sports by her involvement in various committees, board positions and offices in the KSHSAA and the Kansas Coaches Association. A lifetime member of the KCA, she served as the president five years and is currently the Executive Officer. She is very instrumental in getting Kansas Coaches recognized on the National level.

In addition to her work with the KCA, Ginny served nationally on the NFICA Board as the Section 5 representative, holding numerous leadership positions. She served on the Coaches Education Review Committee for nine years (chairperson three years) and also served on the Sportsmanship, Ethics & Integrity Committee. She served two terms on the KSHSAA Board of Directors and was a member of the Executive Board for four years. While serving, she was a member of the Summer Coaching Study Committee.

Among her numerous honors: Kansas & Class 4A Coach of the Year (Boys and Girls Tennis & Softball), NFICA Kansas Softball Coach of the Year and Section 5 NFICA Distinguished Service Award. She was selected as one of three honorees na-

tionwide for the Disney Channel "American Teacher Award".

Whether in the classroom or on the competition court, her students, athletes and colleagues have certainly reaped the benefits from all of her efforts.

Amy Oberhelman

KSHSAA Class 6A Girls State Swimming & Diving Meet
Capitol Federal Natatorium, Topeka*

Amy Oberhelman is considered one of the best Kansas high school swimmers of all time. A student at Manhattan High School from 1990-1994, she is credited with seven league records, nine school records and set six state records -100 Free, 200 Free (twice), 200 Free Relay, 200 Individual Medley, and the 100 Butterfly. In addition to winning 10 state championship titles, she was named an All American 13 times. And 18 years later, she still holds the Kansas state record in the 200 Freestyle.

Amy represented her high school team with extraordinary spirit, kindness and grace. Her focus and pursuit of excellence brought everyone around her to a higher level. She made everyone on the team better because of her dedication, enthusiasm and pursuit of excellence. As talented and skilled as she was, she always displayed an important sign of sportsmanship by never exiting the pool after a race until all of the competitors had finished.

An Academic All-American and Class Valedictorian, she was a member of the National Honor Society and was a National Merit Commended Scholar. From 1989-1992 she was a select camp participant at the Olympic Training Center and in 1993 was an Olympic Festival Team selection.

Amy attended Stanford University, helping lead the Cardinal to three NCAA National Championship titles (1995, 1996 & 1998). She was named an All-American eight times and selected captain of the swim team her senior year. Academically, she had

enormous talent, consistency and dedication to her vision and pursued her goal of becoming an outstanding doctor.

Amy Oberhelman is still revered today. What she accomplished during her swimming and academic careers is truly an inspiration to many.

Garry Sigle

Wichita State University, Wichita, KS*

During 33 years at Riley County High School, Garry Sigle was instrumental in building one of the best Cross Country and Track & Field programs in Kansas. Under his leadership the Falcons won 12 team titles in track and cross country and had 71 individual state champions. Riley County Cross Country runners received all-state honors 53 times. Both the boys and girls teams captured 23 league titles in cross country.

The Riley County girls won 10 league track titles (including the last eight in a row). The boys won 12 league titles (including the last four in a row). Presently there are eight state track record holders from Riley County – more than any other Kansas school. In addition, the Falcons have had at least one individual track & field champion during the last 17 years.

Sigle worked to make his student athletes great runners and great people. While he is admired for his coaching philosophy and wins, perhaps more importantly, he is appreciated for his enthusiasm for young people and what they learned from him away from the athletic arena. In addition to allowing his athletes to experience the rewards of hard work and personal commitment, Sigle impressed the importance of showing good sportsmanship to competitors after a contest and sponsored the Fellowship of Christian Athletes for many years.

Before arriving at Riley County, Sigle was a five-time NAIA All-American athlete at Ft. Hays State University in both indoor and outdoor track & field and also cross country. In 2009 he was inducted into the FHSU Tigers Hall of Fame.

Sigle is credited with over 3,000 career victories and is a four time state and Section 5 Coach of the Year. Regarding his success, he believes that if the kids believe in themselves, that's where it counts – that's where it comes from. To Garry Sigle, there is value in every person.

Wayne Simien

To say that Wayne Simien excelled on the basketball court throughout his four year career at Leavenworth High School is an understatement. The awards in just his senior year are numerous – Mr. Kansas Basketball, Gatorade Player of the Year, Sunflower League Player of the Year, Metro Sports and KC Star Player of the Year, KBCA Player of the Year, Scholastic Sports America-Kansas Athlete of the Year, McDonald's All American, Parade All-American – 2nd Team, etc. Leading the Pioneer's to a Class 6A state title his junior year, he was named All Class 1st Team by the Topeka-Capitol Journal, Wichita Eagle, KC Star and Metro Sports. During his high

school career he averaged (per game) 10 rebounds, 4 blocked shots, 20 points and 87% in free throw shooting. Simien was a coaches "dream", respecting everyone on and off the court.

Wayne Simien was not only the best basketball player to pass through the halls of Leavenworth High School- he was a scholar-athlete who exhibited leadership, honesty, dependability and high moral character. He was recognized for four-years as an Academic All-American and High School honor roll recipient, served as a DARE Role Model, was on the LHS Peer Mediation Team, and served as the vice president of the Youth Achievement Center. In addition, he donated numerous hours of community service.

In his four year career at the University of Kansas (2001-2005), Wayne was an All-American and Wooden Award finalist his junior and senior years and named Big 12 Player of the Year his senior year. He was the 12th leading all-time scorer in Kansas with 1,593 points. On the 150th birthday of our great state, the University of Kansas retired his number 23 jersey. In 2005 he was drafted in the first round by the Miami Heat and helped Miami win an NBA Championship in his rookie season.

Who is in the KSHSAA Hall of Fame?

Two hundred twenty-nine Kansans are members of the KSHSAA Hall of Fame. A complete listing of these inductees can be found on the KSHSAA website: www.kshsaa.org>non-athletic>HallofFame.

To be eligible, nominees must exemplify the highest standards of sportsmanship, citizenship, ethical conduct and moral character. They must have demonstrated outstanding and exceptional abilities in the category for which they are nominated. All nominees are judged on their significant and/or long term contributions to interscholastic activities. Longevity without meaningful impact does not constitute appropriate credentials for Hall of Fame consideration. The nominee must have made a contribution to Kansas high schools in the category for which he/she is being nominated. With the exception of the Contributor category, the nominee cannot be currently active in the nominated category. In the Student category, a nominee must be graduated from high school a minimum of five years.

The KSHSAA Hall of Fame includes 5 categories: Administrator, Faculty, Official, Student and Contributor. Category descriptions may be located on-line.

SIX SIMPLE WAYS TO BE A GOOD SPORT

It is difficult to attend an interscholastic event without witnessing some act of poor sportsmanship. Anytime a large group of people gathers the chances of witnessing unfavorable sporting behavior increases. Peer pressure is a powerful way to curb acts of poor sporting behavior. Not supporting individuals who display poor sportsmanship and instructing them about good sportsmanship can curb this disturbing trend.

High school athletics and extra curricular activities are learning environments where positive sportsmanship is essential. The Kansas State High School Activities Association (KSHSAA) recognizes the importance of instilling positive sportsmanship at all interscholastic events. The KSHSAA calls on the school community – teachers, coaches, directors, students, parents, and fans to strive for sportsmanship in everything they do by teaching the values of dignity, equity, fairness and respect. The following six steps will help everyone understand their responsibilities at an athletic or fine arts event.



Understanding the rules

The necessity to be well informed is essential. Know the rules. If you are uninformed, refrain from expressing opinions about the officials, coaches, players, or administrative decisions. The spirit of good sportsmanship depends on conformance to a rule's intent as well as to the letter of a given rule.

Model your best behavior

Good sportsmanship requires one to understand his/her own prejudices that may become a factor in his/her behavior. The true value of interscholastic competition relies on everyone exhibiting behavior which is representative of a sound value base. A proper perspective must be maintained if the educational values are to be realized. Your behavior influences others whether you are aware of it or not.

Acknowledge all skilled performance

Acknowledging and applauding an opponent's good performance displays generosity and is a courtesy that should be regularly practiced. It not only represents good sportsmanship, but also reflects a true awareness of the game by recognizing and appreciating quality.

Respect the opponents

Opponents are guests and should be treated cordially, with thoughtfulness, be provided with the best accommodations, and accorded tolerance at all times. Be a positive representative for your school, team, and family. This fundamental is the Golden Rule in action.

Respect the officials

The officials of any contest are impartial arbitrators who are trained and who perform to the best of their ability. Mistakes by all participants in the contest are a part of the game. We should not rationalize our own poor or unsuccessful performance or behavior by placing responsibility on the officials. This value is critical for students to learn for later application in life.

Be proud of who you are

Never allow your ego to interfere with good judgment and your responsibility as a school representative. Regardless of whether you are an adult, student, player, coach, director or official, this value is paramount since it suggests that you care about yourself and how others perceive you.

The KSHSAA calls on the school community – teachers, coaches, directors, students, parents, and fans – to strive for sportsmanship in everything they do by teaching the values of dignity, equity, fairness, and respect.

Remember – Sportsmanship is Everybody's Responsibility!

Return To Play Criteria

Ideally all schools would have access to appropriate medical coverage at all school athletic events and practices. But the reality is that for many schools this is not the case. When an athlete gets hurt in the middle of a practice or game, and a physician or certified athletic trainer is not readily available, the decision of whether or not an athlete is healthy enough to return to play many times falls to a coach.

If you are the coach trying to decide if it is safe for an athlete to compete, there are some general guidelines you can follow. Most importantly, if you have any doubts whatsoever about the athlete's ability to safely compete, err on the side of caution, and instruct the athlete they are out of the activity until the proper medical personnel can perform an evaluation. In addition, if the athlete is or has been under the care of a medical professional for the injury in doubt, only that medical professional should decide when the athlete can return to play. Student-athletes who sustain injuries such as suspected concussions, possible fractures, injuries resulting in any type of extremity numbness or tingling, or other potentially serious injuries should never be allowed to return to competition until they are examined by a physician, and written clearance is obtained.

For some of the other more common sports injuries such as muscle strains, joint sprains, bruises, etc., the following can serve as a check-list to determine if the athlete can safely compete:

1. **Range of Motion:** The athlete should have full range of motion of the involved body part when compared to the opposite side.
2. **Strength:** The athlete should have equal strength of the body part when compared with the opposite side. The best way to test an athlete's strength on the sideline is with manual resistance. For example, if you suspect a hamstring strain, instruct the athlete to lie face down, and manually resist knee bending. The athlete should be able to produce a similar amount of force with little to no discomfort when comparing both legs. If the athlete is too sore or too weak with this simple resistance test, you know the athlete cannot return to activity safely.
3. **Function:** Many times a student-athlete will say they're ready to go back in. And they maybe even appear to have normal range of motion and strength. But no athlete in any sport should be allowed to participate after an injury until they have proven they can withstand the functional demands of the activity in a "controlled" environment. If a basketball player rolls his/her ankle, and claims they're ready to go back in, the athlete first should be taken through a series of running tests to see if they can withstand the demands of the game. For a basketball player, this may mean having the athlete prove they can run full speed, cut, jump, and move laterally with minimal discomfort and no limp. If an athlete returns to play, but cannot function at the level that is necessary, he/she is at risk for greater injury.

Even though it can be frustrating for the injured student-athlete, coaches, and teammates when somebody gets hurt and can't return to the competition, it is more discouraging to see an injury that only needed a few days of recovery turn into a season long ordeal because that person tried to return too soon.

Basketball Spring League Information

At this time of the year we get many questions about players and coaches participating in spring league basketball teams. Below are some important guidelines:

1. Coaches employed by the school to coach basketball CANNOT coach the spring league team. This includes head, assistant and Rule 10 coach's aides for grades 9-12 for High School teams and head, assistant, and Rule 10 coach's aides for grades 7-8 for Middle/Junior High School teams.
2. No more than three (3) members of the school squad the previous season can play or practice on a non-school team during the school year outside the season of sport.
3. School squad is defined as A-team, B-team, 9th grade, C-team, JV, Varsity, etc. – these are all different squads.
4. Any amount of time played (even a few seconds) constitutes team membership.
5. If a player played on two levels the previous season (JV & V) they would count as one of the three possible JV players and one of the three possible Varsity players.
6. Players may not be rotated in from week-to-week or game-to-game. The roster established for the non-school team may have no more than three (3) from the same school squad.
7. School transportation cannot be used to take students to spring league games.
8. A school coach could transport the players to the spring league but not in school vehicles and cannot coach them.
9. School year is defined as the Tuesday after Labor Day (Sept. 6, 2011) until the Saturday before Memorial Day (May 26, 2012).
10. Once the school season/practices start players may not play or practice on a non-school team until their membership on the school team ends.
11. After the season, players are restricted to no more than three (3) students from the same school squad playing or practicing on the same non-school team. That restriction remains in effect until the Saturday before Memorial Day. (May 26, 2012)

Guidelines for Coaches and Athletes—Outside Season of Sport

During the school year, coaches may coach their athletes only during the season of sport. (See Rule 10-1-6 for summer instruction opportunities.) The Executive Board has approved the following interpretations per **Rule 30 Seasons of Activities**:

1. During the school year, but outside of the season of sport, any athletic coach **may** transport his or her student-athletes to non-school competitions in their sport.
2. During the summer, an athletic coach **may** transport his or her student-athletes to non-school competitions in their sport.
3. During the school year, but outside of the season of sport, any athletic coach **may not** transport his or her student-athletes to camps and/or clinics in their sport.
4. During the summer, an athletic coach **may** transport his or her student-athletes to camps and/or clinics.
5. Schools **may not be involved directly or indirectly with providing facilities, equipment, transportation or finances.**

Gimmicks Can Deceive Students

At this time of year many high school students, particularly seniors who are involved in athletics, receive literature about various awards programs for which the student might have been nominated. Many times these programs request information about the student-athlete and promise services, and also offer to include the student's name in publications which will be disseminated to colleges throughout the United States. Although many of these programs are sponsored by legitimate businesses, many others exploit students and families. This office advises administrators, coaches, and/or counselors to examine all information carefully if a student is contacted. **It is wise to ask for, and check references.**

RULE 10 - Reminders to Course Instructors

In an effort to serve the needs of KSHSAA member schools, it is important for **ASEP Coaching Education** course instructors throughout Kansas to keep the following key points in mind when administering courses required for coaches aides. These reminders are excerpts from an article in the *ASEP Bulletin* by the ASEP Services Manager.

1. Order course materials before the date of your course.
2. Advertise your course offering by contacting the KSHSAA to request that it be listed on the KSHSAA website, and available for KSHSAA staff reference when fielding telephone inquiries. Contact the ASEP National Center to list your course by calling 1-800-747-5698, EXT. 2235.
3. Be certain all clinic attendees have all the necessary information to fully complete their test answer forms. Contact the ASEP office for a copy of the ASEP codes work sheet to assist you in this process.
4. Always be certain to give coaches taking your course the correct test form to match their course code. This varies depending on the version of the test in their test packet.
5. When giving test directions to your clinic attendees, emphasize these key points:
 - Complete all items on the test form accurately.
 - All coaches must send a completed test answer form to ASEP within six months of their clinic attendance for the test to be valid.
 - Coaches should call ASEP services, 1-800-747-5698, EXT. 2235 or check the ASEP website at www.asep.com if they have not received test results within three weeks of mailing the test answer form to ASEP.
 - Coaches should keep all testing materials together when completing the testing process to avoid a \$10 replacement fee for lost materials.
6. It is important that the information coaches complete on their test forms match exactly, the information instructors provide on their course report form.
7. If team teaching a course, designate one person as the lead instructor to handle the administrative reporting to ASEP.
8. Send your course report form to ASEP Services within two days after teaching your course. (Coaches tests answer forms cannot be processed until the instructors clinic report form is received by ASEP.)
9. Prior to sending your clinic report form to ASEP, review written comments from your students, then send the completed clinic evaluation forms to ASEP along with your coaches report form.
10. ASEP recommends that instructors monitor the testing of their students by asking them to submit completed exams to the instructor which they will then forward to ASEP in one group. If you follow this procedure, send the packet of tests via UPS or certified mail.

ASEP Coaching Education instructors provide a valuable service to the member schools of the KSHSAA. Their contribution grows each year as greater numbers of schools employ coaches aides to staff their activities programs. It is important that the process be handled efficiently so as to avoid confusion and frustration on the part of individual coaches aides, and their employing schools districts, the KSHSAA, and the ASEP Coaching Education Program. Outside Competition Rule 22 – Triathlons and Team Triathlons

From time to time the KSHSAA receives questions regarding student athletes who are members of school cross country, track & field, and swimming and diving teams participating in triathlons outside the school setting.

The Executive Board has established policy relative to these situations. The following defines the events:

Triathlon: A single competitor participates in all three phases (running, swimming and bicycling) of the event.

Team Triathlon: Three competitors each participated in a single phase of the event. It is a three athlete (relay style) event.

Given the above, Executive Board policy permits a student (grades 7-12) to participate in a triathlon and not be in violation of KSHSAA Outside Competition Rule 22. The rationale for this policy is based on the triathlon event differing significantly than the school sport in which the athlete is currently in season.

School athletes may also participate in team triathlons during a school season of sport. In order to avoid violation of Rule 22, school athletes must be careful to not participate in the triathlon phase identical to their school sport. They may only compete in a different phase of the event and not violate the Outside Competition Rule. For example, a swimmer may run or bike, but not compete in the swim phase of the team triathlon. A track & field athlete could bike or swim, but not compete in the running phase.

All athletes should be reminded that KSHSAA Amateur Rule 21 and Awards Rule 21 are in effect as it relates to their desire to protect their interscholastic eligibility.

Team Photos

Schools are reminded, as tournament time approaches for various activities, to make arrangements for team photos. Tournament managers often request photographs in programs for the event. **The KSHSAA requests 5x7 photos for the Kopelk Memorial and billfold-size photos for the track program. Black & white or color photographs are acceptable. (Sub-State pictures are returned by request only.)**

NOTE: when scanning your picture, scan at 50% at 600 dpi or less, and save as a jpeg file.

A few tips for good team photos

1. A **good photograph** makes a good halftone. The printer cannot make a clear image out of a fuzzy, out-of-focus photo.
2. A **good photograph** of the team shows school pride and encourages pride among your school's patrons.
3. A **good photograph** shows all the faces, and ideally all

the jersey/uniform numbers (when applicable). A mom or dad wants to see their child's smiling face in the program after traveling to that post-season tournament.

4. A **good photograph** of large teams can be achieved by thinking **vertically NOT horizontally**. Add more rows instead of making two or three long rows. This will enable the photographer to come in for a closer shot of your group. **The closer the shot, the clearer the faces!**
5. A **good photograph** is accompanied by proper identification. Type the group members' names so there will be no doubt as to spelling. It is disappointing to students and parents to have their name misspelled or omitted from a tournament program.
6. A **good photograph** is planned far in advance to allow for a retake.
7. **Lastly, a good photograph** arrives to the tournament manager and the KSHSAA before the deadline date.

Basketball Sportsmanship Awards

The Kansas State High School Activities Association acknowledges outstanding sportsmanship each year by presenting sportsmanship certificates, plaques, and medals. Sportsmanship Awards will be presented in the girls and boys division following the State Championship Basketball Tournaments, if the sportsmanship committee determines schools to be worthy of the honor. The eight schools participating in each tournament may qualify for an award. A "rating" system will be used allowing schools to compete against a "standard of excellence," rather than competing against one another.

Schools whose teams do not advance to the semifinal rounds will be eligible to receive a certificate if they meet the qualifying standards of sportsmanship.

The four teams participating in all three days of the tournament and achieving qualifying standards will receive a plaque for the school and medals for the cheerleaders.

A special committee appointed by the KSHSAA will evaluate and rate the cheerleaders, cheering section, adult and non-high school followers, team, and coach of each school using a rubric sportsmanship ballot. If a school does not have cheerleaders, the sportsmanship committee will adjust the point system accordingly.

The rubric sportsmanship ballot is available at www.kshsaa.org, click on "Activities" tab, select "Sportsmanship" on dropdown, click on "State Basketball Sportsmanship Ballot".

Announcement of the Sportsmanship Awards will be made on Friday following the State Basketball Tournament from the KSHSAA office.

Sportsmanship award criteria

Coaches/Teams

1. Set a good example for opponents, players and spectators to follow.
2. Respect the integrity and judgment of game officials, and accept their decisions graciously.
3. Respect the integrity and personality of the individual athlete.

4. Display modesty in victory and graciousness in defeat.
5. Encourage players and fans to "Sport a Winning Attitude!"

Cheerleaders/Students/Fans

1. Show respect for opposing players, coaches, spectators, and support groups.
2. Recognize and show appreciation for outstanding plays by either team.
3. Use only cheers that are positive in support of their team.
4. Encourage coaches, players, and other fans to "Sport a Winning Attitude!"



Basketball

Forms Due

As the basketball season comes to a close, coaches and administrators are reminded the following forms are due to the KSHSAA. Forms are located in the entry forms section behind the administrative password on the KSHSAA website.

- Official Recommendation forms (BB-1-Girls; BB-2-Boys) must be submitted on-line by February 8, 2012. **Schools are to recommend 15 officials they have observed this year for post-season consideration.**
- Win-Loss Record form (BB-3-Girls; BB-4-Boys) must be submitted to the sub-state manager by Feb. 20th for Classes 1A-4A and Feb. 22nd for Classes 5A-6A.
- Sub-State Roster and Pass Gate list (BB-5-Girls; BB-6-Boys) must be submitted to the sub-state manager by Feb. 23rd.
- State Roster and Pass Gate Information (BB-7-Girls; BB-8-Boys) must be submitted online by February 29th. Information submitted on BB-5 and BB-6 will be carried over to these forms so schools just have to make corrections.
- Game Scores form (BB-9-Girls; BB-10-Boys) must be submitted online by February 29th. Schools may enter games as they are played during the year and save, this will keep an ongoing list of games played, opponents and scores so you don't have to complete all at the end of the season.

Roster & Pass Gate Procedure

Rosters and pass-gate information will be stored in an online database allowing schools to make corrections at anytime so schools do not have to re-type this information. Form BB-5 (girls) and BB-6 (boys) generate the sub-state roster and pass gate. Once the information has been submitted click continue at the bottom of the form. This will allow schools to print a roster and pass gate form to fax to the sub-state manager. Schools must submit State roster, picture and pass gate information by February 29, 2012 on forms Girls-BB-7 and Boys-BB-8. If a school qualifies for the state tournament and has not submitted BB-7 or BB-8 the KSHSAA will take the information stored in the database from the sub-state roster/

pass gate and use it for the state program for teams qualifying for the state tournament. Schools must update any roster by March 3. The KSHSAA will provide pass gate information to the state sites on March 5 based on the list provided.

The KSHSAA Code of Ethics

With concluding games of regular season basketball competition approaching, and anticipation of post-season basketball tournaments, the KSHSAA reminds all those involved of the policies concerning ethical relationship between coaches and officials during and immediately following a contest. (*See the Code of Ethics, in the Basketball Manual*).

Boys Swimming & Diving



Boys State Meet February 16-18

The Boys State Swimming and Diving Meet will be held on February 16-18, 2012, at The Capitol Federal Natatorium at Hummer Sports Park, Topeka. The meet will be conducted in two classes (6A) & (5-4-3-2-1A).

The preliminaries in diving (all-classes) will begin at 2 p.m. on Thursday, with semi-finals to follow one hour after the preliminaries. Preliminaries in swimming events will begin Friday at 10:00 a.m. for Classes 5-1A and at 4:00 p.m. for Class 6A. Diving finals will begin at 1:30 p.m. on Friday for all classes. Finals for swimming will begin on Saturday at 10:30 a.m. for Classes 5-1A and 3:00 p.m. for Class 6A. It is recommended league meets be held one week prior to the state meet.

Preliminary heats and lanes for the boys state meet will be drawn at the KSHSAA office. **Coaches will be requested to place the best meet time for each entrant listed on the state meet entry form using Hy-Tech Team Manager.** They should keep a record of each boy's performance time so this information will be available when entering boys in the state meet.

Please refer to the KSHSAA Swimming & Diving Manual and the December *Activities Journal*, pages 11-12, for order of events and minimum performance requirements.

Bowling



Bowling Season

The KSHSAA interscholastic bowling season is underway across the state with 79 schools participating. Several copies of the *KSHSAA Bowling Manual* (Red) were mailed to participating schools in October. A thorough study of this manual should answer many questions that might come up during the season.

Regional Tournaments

Regional bowling tournaments will be conducted across the state the week of **February 20-25**. Working with the bowling center, the tournament manager will establish the time schedule. **Regional tournament assignments** are posted on the KSHSAA website (www.kshsaa.org). Schools will compete in two classifications (6A; 5-4-3-2-1A). There will be 3 regional sites in class 6A. The top 3 teams and the next 6 highest individual scores that are not members of a qualifying team will advance to the state tournament. In classes 5-1A there will be 4 regional sites with the top 2 teams and the next 6 highest individual scores that are not members of a qualifying team advancing to state competition.

Participating schools must submit **Regional Entry Card (BWL-2, Boys; BWL-3, Girls)** to their regional manager by **February 20**. **Regional Pass Gate Forms (BWL-4, Boys; BWL-5, Girls)** are also due to the manager on **February 20**. School teams may enter a maximum of 6 players and must attend the regional tournament to which they are assigned. Tournament managers will mail information to participating schools prior to the tournament. Please see the Bowling Manual for additional information.

State Tournaments

The 2012 state bowling tournaments will be conducted on **Thursday, March 1** (6A) and **Friday, March 2** (5-1A). See bowling page at www.kshsaa.org for the time schedules. All four state tournaments will be conducted at **Northrock Lanes**, 3232 N. Rock Road, Wichita, KS 67226, (316) 636-5444. Wichita-North High School will host the 6A tournament with Brian Becker serving as manager. The 5-4-3-2-1A State tournament will be hosted by Wichita-Carroll High School with Larry Dostert serving as manager.

Qualifying schools must submit the **State Entry Fee Card (BWL-6, Boys; BWL-7, Girls)** and \$8 per bowler to the KSHSAA by **Friday, March 9**. The **State Pass Gate Form (BWL-8, Boys; BWL-9, Girls)** is due to the state tournament manager on **Monday, February 27**.

State qualifiers will be posted on the KSHSAA website Monday, February 27. In even-numbered years (2012) the even numbered classifications will compete first (6A) and the boys will compete first followed by the girls.

Spring Soccer



Girls State Tournament

The KSHSAA is planning for the 20th annual Girls State Soccer Championship Tournament. Friday and Saturday, May 25 and 26 are the dates for state semifinals and finals, with 5A at Topeka-501 Hummer Sports Complex and 6A at the College Boulevard Activity Center in Olathe. The 4-1A site has yet to be announced.

If your school is fielding a girls soccer team this spring, please return **Spring Sports Entry Form ADM-8** and the **required entry fee by the January 20 deadline**. Seeding meetings will be held on Saturday, May 12 at sites listed in the *KSHSAA Soccer Manual*.

Regional tournament games are scheduled for Monday or Tuesday (prelims), and Thursday (finals) of SCW #46. State quarterfinals games will be played Tuesday, May 22. Four teams will qualify to the state semifinals, Friday, May 25. Consolation and championship games will be played Saturday, May 26.

Schools competing in regular spring soccer are reminded **KSHSAA Rule 11 REQUIRES** the use of registered officials. Participating schools are reminded that the **KSHSAA Soccer Rule 38** and the National Federation Soccer Rules are in effect throughout regular season competition and tournaments. Rules Meeting

The KSHSAA Track and Field rules meeting for coaches and officials will be held online in 2012. The online meeting will be up and running from February 20 – March 30. All head coaches and all starters are required to attend this meeting.

Head Coaches should login for the meeting using the User ID and password sent to your AD or Principal.

Rules Exam

Persons registering as starters and head coaches are required to successfully complete the 2012 Track and Field Rules Examination, Part I. Examinations will be online from February 20 – April 2, 2012. You will be mailed a 100 question practice exam to help you with the 50 question online exam.

Track & Field Manual

Member Senior High Schools will receive copies of the 2012 Track and Field Manual in February.

Per Handbook Rule 42-2-5 and 6, regional assignments will be on the KSHSAA website on or before March 8. **A reminder; Regional sites must have the capabilities of correctly and successfully running the regional computer program.** Regional Track and Field entries will again be made on-line (Internet) via www.kshsaa.org.

Specifics on how to access your school site to complete entries will be available in the KSHSAA manual.

KSHSAA Handbook, Rule 42

- 42-2-4** No student representing a member school shall participate in more than eight (8) track meets during a season, exclusive of regional and state meets. NFHS Track and Field Rule 4—Participation and Entry Limitations.
- NFHS 4-2-1 . . . A competitor shall not compete in more than four events, including relays.**
- 4-2-2 . . . A contestant shall not be entered in more than four events, excluding relays.**
- 42-3-1** No student (Middle/Junior High) shall participate in more than seven (7) days of competition during a season. Exception: ninth grade students in junior high schools shall be permitted to compete in the same number of athletic competitions as ninth graders in senior high schools.

- 42-3-2** Seventh and eighth grade students shall be limited to four events per day (track and/or field.) Any number of these may be relays.
 - a. Seventh and eighth grade students are limited to no more than two races of 880 yards (800M) or more in one day.

Baseball & Softball Notes

Baseball and softball coaches, please take note of the following dates for the 2012 spring season. The 2012 regionals will be held the week of May 14 through 18 and the state tournaments will be held May 25-26.

The Spring Sports Entry Fee Form ADM-8 was due in the KSHSAA office January 20. **The tabulation of this form will determine the number of Classes and number of state tournament sites necessary for both softball and baseball.**

Regional sites and groupings will be posted on the KSHSAA website by April 4, 2012. Locations of state sites are posted on the *KSHSAA website*. Remember, schools are to use registered softball and baseball umpires for all varsity competition. Coaches and umpires are encouraged to recruit new umpires for the youth of our state.

Head coaches are required to complete the online rules meeting and submit answers to NFHS test I online. Test answers are due March 23, 2012. Instructions on how to complete the online meeting, NFHS test I and the 2012 Baseball/Softball manual were mailed to athletic directors on January 10. Athletic Directors should distribute this information to the appropriate coaches. The online meeting will be available for credit until March 21, 2012.

2012 Baseball Bat Rule

Beginning January 1, 2012, all bats not made of a single piece of wood shall meet the Batted Ball Coefficient of Restitution (BBCOR) performance standard, and such bats shall be labeled with a silkscreen or other permanent certification mark. The certification mark shall be rectangular, a minimum of a half-inch on each side and located on the barrel of the bat in any contrasting color. Aluminum and composite bats shall be labeled as approved tamper evident, and be marked as to being aluminum or composite. This marking shall be silkscreen or other permanent certification mark, a minimum of one-half-inch on each side and located on the barrel of the bat in any contrasting color.

A bat without the BBCOR marking is illegal for use in games or practices. Coaches are responsible for making sure all bats meet the NFHS standard.

Bats that are altered from the manufacturer's original design and production, or that do not meet the rule specifications, are illegal (See 7-4-1a). No foreign substance may be inserted into the bat. Bats that are broken, cracked or dented or that deface the ball, i.e., tear the ball, shall be removed without penalty. A bat that continually discolors the ball may be removed from the game with no penalty at the discretion of the umpire.

Rationale: Recent bat products have circumvented the intent and spirit of the current rule. Improvements in science and technology now allow this change that will require bats to be within performance limits during the life of the bat. In addition, this change will minimize the ability for the bat to be tampered or altered.

Softball Bat Lists

The following policy was adopted by the KSHSAA Executive Board and applies to all interscholastic softball games.

NFHS Rule 1-5-4 states "All bats shall meet the 2004 ASA Bat Performance Standard, bear either the 2000 or 2004 ASA Certification mark, and not be on the ASA non-approved list found on www.asasoftball.com."

All schools and coaches must make sure any bats being used by players have the 2000 or 2004 ASA certification mark and not be listed on the ASA non-approved list as found on the ASA softball web site. Coaches must provide the non-approved bat list for umpires to review prior to the contest. Umpires should bring a copy of the non-approved bat list to contests they umpire. The KSHSAA website (www.kshsaa.org) is linked to the ASA website on the softball page.

Volleyball



Ordering Uniforms

As a reminder, when it is time for your school to order new volleyball uniforms, please be aware of the following NFHS Volleyball rule (4-2):

Players on a team shall wear like-colored uniforms, which consist of shirts and shorts with the exception of the libero player. The libero player shall wear the same shorts as their teammates and a **uniform top that is immediately recognized from all angles as being in clear contrast to and distinct from the other members of the team**. The primary color of the libero top must be different from any color that appears on more than 25% of the body of the teammates' top. The style and trim on the libero top may differ from the teammates' top.

When ordering the libero players' top, please consider the following: **hue** (color), **value** (lightness or darkness of a color), and **saturation** (intensity and purity of color). Attention should be given to the color of the regular team uniform as well as the libero top. Similar dark colors such as maroon and black, purple and black, navy blue and black, etc. or light colors such as beige and white, yellow and white, peach and white, etc. should not be used together.

The number on the libero top is equally important. It must be clearly visible and in contrast to the predominant color of the uniform top.

When ordering libero tops, please consider the number of libero player tops needed. From the standpoint of hygiene and communicable skin conditions, sharing uniforms tops during competition is strongly discouraged.

Spirit Groups

Attendance at Spirit Group Festivals and Competition Events

During the school year, member school Spirit Groups (Cheerleaders, Dance/Drill Teams, Pompon Squads, Flag Teams, etc.) may only participate in spirit group festivals, workshops, clinics, or spirit competition events that are sponsored by Kansas member schools or approved by the KSHSAA Executive Board. Approved events are updated weekly on the front page of the KSHSAA website under the "Approved Events" link.

Summer Spirit Conferences

Because of the important leadership role cheerleaders and other spirit groups play in their schools, the KSHSAA has continually sought ways to meet the needs of these young people and their coaches/sponsors/advisors.

The KSHSAA and Universal Cheerleaders/Dance Association (UCA/UDA) provide high quality summer cheer/dance conferences. Spirit groups serve as support groups for the interscholastic activities within your schools and communities. UCA/UDA is committed to promoting and preserving the sound traditions of spirit groups and the safety of participants.

Members of the nationally acclaimed UCA/UDA staff will conduct all of the summer spirit group conferences for cheerleaders and drill teams/dance/pompon squads. These conferences are sponsored by the KSHSAA as a service to member schools.

Seven cheer and seven dance conference sites and dates are scheduled. Conferences for drill teams, pompon squads and dance teams conducted simultaneously with cheerleader squads will be held in different areas of the college campuses.

Summer conference fees are \$250 per delegate or sponsor. (Schools bringing 10-19 delegates - 1 sponsor fee is 1/2 price.) (Schools bringing 20+ delegates - 1 sponsor fee is free.)

Cheerleaders, drill teams, dance teams, and pompon squads are invited to attend any of the conferences (designed for their particular type of spirit group), but an effort has been made to consider travel distances. All conferences include three nights, nine meals, insurance, outstanding instruction and supervision. **(\$250 per delegate)**

Schools are strongly urged to send sponsors and/or chaperons with their students. Sponsors attending KSHSAA conferences will also be able to attend the required KSHSAA Spirit coaches rules meeting.

State Basketball: Halftime Request Procedure

Schools are welcome to provide halftime entertainment at KSHSAA state basketball tournaments. Request for a performance time from the high school principal shall be made at least one week preceding the state basketball tournament. Spirit groups will be considered and assigned, regardless of their school's having qualified a team for the state tournament. **Note:** Schools are welcome to apply to sites outside of their classification in an effort to reduce travel costs.

Spirit groups will perform only at the halftime of the last game played on each of the four days. This policy is necessary since participating basketball teams normally practice at the halftime of the game preceding their contest in order to adjust to the new surroundings of the state tournament site.

A maximum of two spirit groups may be allowed to perform at the halftime of the last game which may necessitate extending the halftime period. Each group will be **limited to a maximum five-minute** performance, which includes the time necessary for getting on and off the floor.



Speech & Drama

Regional Speech & Drama Festival, April 21

The KSHSAA will sponsor seven regional speech and drama festivals on Saturday, April 21.

Regional site assignments are listed on the KSHSAA website: www.kshsaa.org, go to activities, non-athletic, then click on Speech & Drama. Schools have been assigned according to their geographical location, insofar as possible. Because of the number of one-act plays, it was also necessary to keep in mind the theatre facilities at each of the centers when assignments were made. **Should the name of your school not appear on the assignment list, please contact the KSHSAA immediately.**

All entries for regional speech festivals will be completed online and submitted online. No faxes will be necessary. Entry submission is required on or before April 5. Entry fee of \$10 for each student in each event, including duet acting and one-act play casts (\$30 minimum-\$50 maximum fee for one-act play) must be mailed to the regional manager. An invoice will be automatically generated for you to print and process for payment upon submission of your online entry.

Coaches are urged to read carefully the *Speech and Drama Manual* for procedures to be used at the regional and state festivals.

Invitational Speech Tournaments Report Form

Invitational speech tournament results and a code of ethics report **MUST BE COMPLETED** by the host manager immediately following the contest and submitted online to the KSHSAA. The report form can be found online by accessing the KSHSAA web page. Hover over the “schools” tab and click “log-in”. Enter your name, User ID and coach’s password. Please see your school administrator if you do not know the User ID and password. Once logged in, click on the “Activities” link at the top of the page, scroll until you find the speech section, and click on “Host Tournament Report.” This is an online entry report. Complete the needed information (email address is required) and click “submit” button. You will receive a confirmation email when the report is received by KSHSAA. Print and save this confirmation for your records. Failure to file the report may cause disqualification to regional and/or state competition.

Speech Ballots Available

The KSHSAA prints ballots for each of the events sponsored in invitational festivals. **An order form is included in the back of the KSHSAA *Speech and Drama Manual*.** All orders will be filled promptly upon request. **Note: Price is 5 cents each.** Please specify the number of ballots needed for each event. There is a \$10 minimum order. No charge for postage.

Coach or Adult Supervisor Must Always Accompany Students

Some KSHSAA schools have programs in an activity with only one or two participants and the following policy may be overlooked:

No team (or student) shall represent his or her school at any time in connection with interscholastic competition unless accompanied by a coach or another appointed member of the school faculty. (*KSHSAA Speech & Drama Manual, Page 20*)

EXCEPTION: A non-certified person may serve as an adult supervisor of an activity when appointed by the administrator, in areas where no coaching/directing takes place. **The adult supervisor may not coach/direct as outlined in Rule 10.** They may simply provide the transportation to and from the activity and be responsible for supervision during the activity.

Regional Piano Festivals—February 4

Regional Piano Festivals will be held on Saturday, February 4. Deadline date for entries was January 17.

State Piano Festival—February 18

State Piano Festival will be held on Saturday, February 18. Entries must be made online. No paper forms or faxes will be honored. Entries are made by logging in to the “Festival Manager” found on the KSHSAA website: www.kshsaa.org, go to activities, non-athletic, then click on piano. Any questions need to be directed to Reggie Romine at the KSHSAA office. Deadline date for entries to be submitted online is February 7. State Piano will be held at Tabor College, Hillsboro.

State Basketball Star-Spangled Banner Performance

School performances of the *Star-Spangled Banner* are welcomed at the KSHSAA State Basketball tournaments. On or after **January 1**, the high school principal should request an opportunity to perform. **Vocal performing groups** will be considered and assigned, regardless of their school’s team qualifying for the tournament. **Letters of request will be accepted until 12 noon on Friday, preceding state basketball tournament week.** **Note:** Schools are welcome to apply to sites outside their classification in an effort to reduce travel costs.

The *Star-Spangled Banner* will be performed before the first game of each session on each of the four days. Performance times not assigned by the KSHSAA will be scheduled by tournament management during state basketball tournament week.

Music Festival Reminders - Online Entry

Preparation has already begun in schools throughout the state as young musicians look forward to the opportunity to do their best at the KSHSAA Music Festivals.

Assignments have been made to regional music festivals for solos and small ensembles and state festivals for large groups. All sites and managers for the state music festival for the state music festival for solos and small ensembles have been established. Information concerning the sites, managers, and assignments may be found on the KSHSAA website: www.kshsaa.org, go to activities, non-athletic, then click on music.

Please note the regional site and manager to which your school has been assigned. You are reminded regionals will be held for solos and small ensembles only. Most Class 3A, 2A, and 1A festivals are scheduled for March 31 (entry deadline is March 9) and Class 6A, 5A, and 4A festivals are set for April 14 (entry deadline is March 23).

Your school's name should also appear on the state assignment list for large groups, April 18 or 19 (entry deadline is March 20).

State music festivals for solos and small ensembles will be held at six sites on April 28 (entry deadline for all March 31st state qualifiers is April 3 and for all April 14th state qualifiers is April 17).

All regional and state entries must be made online. No paper forms or faxes will be honored. Entries are made by logging in to the "Festival Manager" found on the **KSHSAA website: www.kshsaa.org, go to activities, non-athletic, then click on music.** Any questions need to be directed to Reggie Romine or the festival manager.

Music Directors Must Register

Every high school band, orchestra, and choral director must sign up by registering to the KSHSAA music "Festival Manager" site. Schools that plan on entering a regional or state music festival this spring must register and begin familiarizing themselves with this website. If you have not received the instructions on how to complete this IMPORTANT registration process, email Reg Romine at rromine@kshsaa.org. All music entries will be done online this year using "Festival Manager". Two workshop sessions at the KMEA In-Service in Wichita will be presented to assist music directors in reviewing this process.

Intelligent Accompaniment Rule

Intelligent accompaniments (e.g., Smart Music) will be allowed for solo performances only when a qualified accompanist is not available. Schools shall bring their own equipment to be used at the festivals and the scheduled performance time limit must include the setting up and taking down of equipment. The intelligent accompaniment unit must be set on the interactive mode for all performances and the intelligent accompaniment must follow the performer. It must be used as piano accompaniment only and is not to be used in orchestral or any other accompaniment modes. Non-interactive accompaniment recording, such as CD or MIDI, etc., will not be allowed. Intelligent accompaniments should only be utilized as a last option when a qualified accompanist is not available.

Non-Piano Accompaniments Rule

Piano and other instrumental accompanists for vocal groups may be eligible students or adult musicians of the director's choice. Instrumental accompaniment shall not be considered part of the ensemble and should not influence the judging of the choral performance.

Please note, piano is considered a member of string and percussion ensembles and therefore the pianist must be an eligible student.
